Food as Medicine: The CCHHS Partnership

- CCHHS: Community Health Centers, Patients, County Care Health Plan, Impact 20/20 (section 2 & 6)
- BOC-Healthy Food Hub: 8 + year history of food hub work addressing low food access & insecurity in high need communities. Local food system development, aggregating local harvest from small farms while training the next generation of farmers. USDA registered, NFP Food Hub
- Experimental Station: Provides LINK MATCH double value, administrator for the USDA FINI award



Impact 2020: CCHHS Strategic Plan

- Highlighted Tactics: Expand "Food as Medicine" program.
 - Objective 6.3 Partner with other organizations to address population health care needs outside of the health care system, including those related to social determinants of health.
 - Measurement & Milestones: 2017: Expand "Food as Medicine" program to all outpatient sites. 2018-2019: Create new food access and distribution programs for CountyCare members and CCHHS patients. 2017-2019: Support community opportunities to bring fresh food into communities, including urban farms and food co-ops.

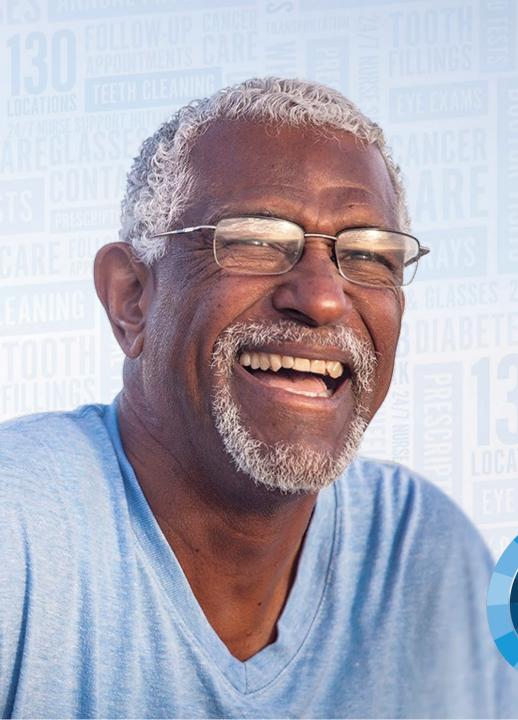

Spotlight HEDIS Measure: WCC

Weight Assessment and Counseling for Nutrition and Physical Activity for Children/Adolescents

- The percentage of members 3–17 years of age who had documentation of an outpatient visit with a PCP or OB/GYN and who had evidence of the following during the measurement year (January 1st – December 31st):
 - BMI percentile documentation
 - Must have height and weight; BMI must be represented as a percentile
 - Counseling for nutrition
 - One of the following: current nutrition behaviors; checklist with nutrition addressed; counseling/referral for nutrition counseling; weight/obesity counseling
 - Counseling for physical activity or referral for physical activity
 - One of the following: current physical activity behaviors e.g. exercise routine, participation in sports activities; checklist indicating physical activity was addressed; counseling/referral for physical activity; educational materials on physical activity in face-face visit; weight/obesity counseling.

How can care coordination help?

- Outreach member/family schedule annual well-child visits with assigned PCP
- Promote wellness and improve health behaviors
- Actively engage the member/family in goal setting and monitor progress towards goals
- Encourage members to discuss BMI, nutrition, and physical activity with their PCPs
- Refer and link member/family to community resources

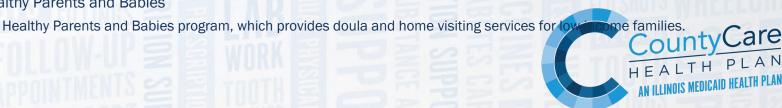
- The Office of Head Start (OHS) promotes the school readiness of young children from low-income families through local programs.

School Readiness Begins with Health!



Consider this information when engaging a family about health:

- Health History & Nutrition Assessment
- Screening results
- Child Assessment results (GOLD & COR)
- · Family Assessment and Outcomes
- · Illness, absences, and missed HB visits
- Information from FCR, Transition Plans, Parent Conferences
- Exams, IHPs/INPs
- Observations and Input from parents, other staff and consultants

Support with Medical & Dental Care

- · Help the family to get the child up to date
- And help the family keep the child up to date
- Help with medication, chronic condition or treatment need
- Make appointments, remind about appointments and attend appointments with families
- · Obtaining results/documentation with parent consent
- Programs can pay for services (when no other option is available)

Ongoing

FSS assist parents/guardians by:

- Help families understand the impact of health on learning and school readiness
- Providing health education on chronic conditions, treatment needs (such as dental) and ongoing well-child health care
- Empowering families to advocate for health services their child should be receiving
- Helping families obtain, keep, understand and use health insurance
- Developing and implementing IHP, INP, or other health plan
- Understanding, obtaining, and managing medications or equipment needed for chronic conditions

Home-Base Enrollment

Before enrollment, at a minimum, obtain health insurance status and immunization record. If either missing, develop next steps to obtain them. Best practice is to also obtain well-child exam. If no exam, make an appointment/plan with family.

Center-Base Enrollment

Before 1st day of attendance (to meet DCFS licensing requirements):

- Physical with Immunization record:
- 1 A completed physical, signed and dated by a physican within 6 months prior to enrollment (unless transitioning from another childcare center)
- 2 An immunization record (with at least one dose of each required immunization according to age)
- 3 A TB determination (>12 months). As determined by physician, a skin test with result (if high risk) or risk assessment (if low risk).
- 4 A lead determination (> 12 months). A lead test (if high risk) or lead risk assessment (if low risk)
- $\bullet \ \ \text{Action plans, food substitutions, medications (with consents), to meet any emergency need.}$

Additional Requirements During Enrollment

- Signed Consents (onsite health services, hearing & vision, etc.)
- A copy of medical insurance card
- Health History and Nutrition Assessment

NOTE: Ask your Health Manager for help if the family is experiencing homelessness and is having trouble with any health requirements.

Within 30 Days

Using the Health History form, determine if the family has:

- Medical Insurance
- If Medicaid, identify the Managed Care Organization
- Medical Home
- Dental Home

NOTE: If the family does NOT have one of these components, follow-up and support must be provided. The follow-up must continue until the family obtains appropriate insurance, medical and dental home.

Within 45 Days

Sensory, developmental and social-emotional screenings:

- Hearing
- Vision
- ASQ SE
- ASQ 3 or ESI-R

Within 90 Days

- Complete physical/well child exam according to EPSDT schedule
- Age appropriate immunizations
- Height, Weight, BMI
- Head Circumference (<24 months)
- TB Assessment (according to age and risk factors)
- Blood pressure (>36 months)
- Lead Screening (requirements dependent on location, age, risk factors and past results)
- Hemoglobin (HGB) or Hematocrit (HCT) results
- Dental Exam & Cleaning with Fluoride (>24 months)

REMEMBER: Health checklists provide detailed list of EPSDT requirements. Refer to them for guidance on your program's specific requirements.

NOTE: If the child is not up-to-date within 90 days, a PLAN must be made with the family. Use the 90 Day Determination Form to organize and plan next steps.

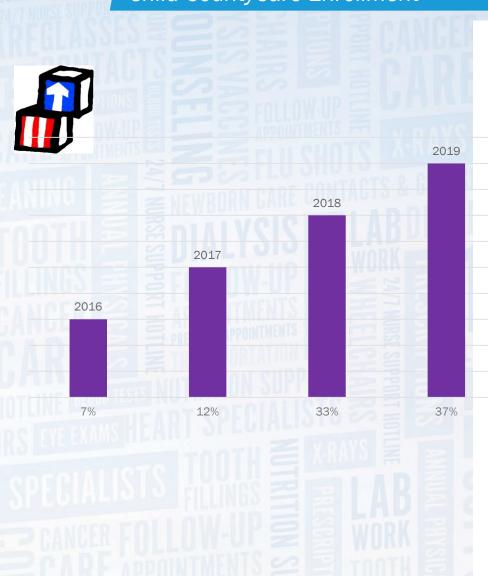

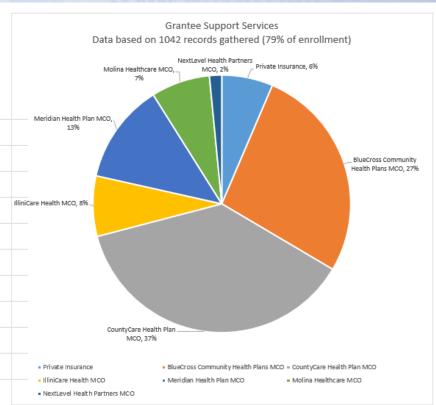

Earn \$25 every year for seeing your Primary Care Provider



CountyCare members 16 months or older can earn a \$25 reward once a year just for seeing their Primary Care Provider (PCP) for a check-up. After your appointment, you will receive a Rewards Card in the mail with money credited to the card. Once activated, you can use the card for home and health items at Walgreens, CVS (not in Target stores), Dollar General, Family Dollar and Walmart. If you already have a Rewards Card, the \$25 will be added to your current card.

CountyCare members 13 and older get free vouchers for Weight Watchers meetings near your home. Call Member Services to request and we will mail them to you.

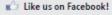
Free Diapers
